From your co-president...

Living Prayer of Compassion

The following is from ***With Open Hands***, by Henri J. M. Nouwen:

"When you pray, you discover not only yourself and God, but also your neighbor. For in prayer you profess not only that people are people and God is God, but also, that your neighbor is your sister or brother living alongside you. For the same conversion that brings you to the painful knowledge of your wounded human nature also brings you to the joyful recognition that you are not alone, but that being human means being together.

"At precisely this point, compassion is born. This compassion is not covered with the word 'pity,' nor by the word 'sympathy.'" Pity connotes too much distance. Sympathy implies an exclusive nearness. Compassion goes beyond distance and exclusiveness. Compassion grows with the inner recognition that your neighbor shares your humanity with you. This partnership cuts through all walls which might have kept you separate. Across all barriers of land and language, wealth and poverty, knowledge and ignorance, we are one, created from the same dust, subject to the same laws and destined for the same end.

"With this compassion you can say, 'In the face of the oppressed I recognize my own face and in the hands of the oppressor I recognize my own hands. Their flesh is my flesh; their blood is my blood; their pain is my pain; their smile is my smile. Their ability to torture me is in me, too; their capacity to forgive I find also in myself. There is nothing in me that does not belong to them too. There is nothing in them that does not belong to me too. In my heart I know their yearnings for love, and down to my entrails I can feel their cruelty. In another's eyes I see my plea for forgiveness, and in a hardened frown, I see my own refusal. When someone murders, I know that I too could have done that, and when someone gives birth, I know that I am capable of that as well. In the depths of my being, I meet my fellows human beings with whom I share love and hate, life and death.'

"Compassion is daring to acknowledge our mutual destiny so that we might move forward, all together, into the land which God is showing us. Compassion also means sharing in joy, which can be just as important as sharing in pain. To give others the chance to be completely happy, to let their joy blossom to the full. We offer real comfort and support when we can say from our hearts: 'That's really good for you,' or 'I'm glad to see you made it.'

"But this compassion is more than a shared slavery with the same fear and the same sighs of relief and more than a shared joy. For if your compassion is born of prayer, it is born of your meeting with God who is also the God of all people. At the moment that you fully realize that the God who loves you unconditionally loves all your fellow human beings with the same love, a new way of living opens itself to you. For you come to see with new eyes those who live beside you in this world. You realize that they, too, have no reason to fear, that they, too, do not have to hide behind a hedge, that they, too, need no weapons to be human. You see that the inner garden of love which has remained unattended for so long is also meant for them.

"Conversion to God, therefore, means a simultaneous conversion to the other persons who live with you on this earth ... and so compassion removes all pretensions, just as it removes false modesty. It invites you to understand everything and everyone, to see yourself and others in the light of God and to joyfully tell everyone you meet that there is no reason to fear; the land is free to be cultivated and to yield a rich harvest." As we move through sacred seasons in our varying yet similar faiths, may we invite such compassion to live within us. Shalom, Salaam, the peace which passes understanding. *Bob Long*

Our March 14th interfaith dialogue dinner at Immaculate Conception Church in Glenville was a tremendous success. Co-sponsored with the church's Amazing God Team, the evening drew over 130 participants, 80 of whom came for dinner, catered by Kazeez's in Albany. Rabbi Beverly Magidson, Rev. James Kane and Imam Djafer Sebkhauoui each spoke approximately 15 minutes on *Jesus as Viewed by the Three Abrahamic Faiths*. Questions followed. We are indebted to Maryann Haskell, head of the Amazing God Team; the Rosary Altar Society and Betty Parks and members of the Nurse/Health Ministry for setting up the hall and providing desserts and the Youth Ministry for helping to serve. Would that more of our dinners would have such an impact on attendance and participation.

Our program on April 18th at Faith United Methodist Church is also very interesting and should garner your full support because *it features our youth, the next generation of interfaith peacekeepers*. If you have never heard the teen-agers from The Children at the Well then you are in for a treat. Trained by professional story-tellers, they tell faith-related stories that provoke tears and laughter. They are looking for support from us. Don't let them down. These coming weeks will be celebrated with intense fervor by Christians and Jews alike. Jews commemorate the eight days of Passover in memory of their deliverance from Egyptian bondage. This is highlighted by the opening Seders, or ritual family dinners. Christians will recall the institution of the Eucharist (HolyThursday), crucifixion and death (Good Friday) and resurrection (Easter) of Jesus Christ. The Triduum is the pinnacle of the liturgical year.

The recent articles by Carl Strock in the Daily Gazette should cause deep concern in our religious communities. The state of Israel and concern for its policies are a different matter and should not be lumped with one's religious beliefs. There will be more said on this situation later, but our Interfaith Community should stand in support of our Jewish friends and neighbors. Interfaith Calendar for April 2012

- 1 Palm Sunday – **Christian** -- Celebration of the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. The day begins Holy Week. It is observed by worship celebrations and parades using palm branches.
Ramanavami – **Hindu** -- Celebration of the birth of Lord Rama, hero of the religious epic poem, The Ramayana. The day involves telling of stories and going to the temple.
- 5 Maundy Thursday -- **Christian** -- Observance of the first Lord's Supper during Holy Week.
Lord's Evening Meal -- **Jehovah's Witness Christians**.
- 6-9 Theravadin New Year -- **Buddhist** – On New Year day, people in Buddhist countries make a visit to temples and monasteries, bath Buddha statues, offer prayers and worship to Lord Buddha, and call for getting conferred with happy and peaceful times ahead.
- 6 Good Friday -- **Christian** -- Christian remembrance of the crucifixion of Jesus and related events.
Hanuman Jayanti – **Hindu** -- Celebration of Hanuman who was an embodiment of Lord Rama. Devotion and selfless work are encouraged.
Mahavir Jayanti – **Jain** -- Festival honoring Lord Mahavira on the founder's birthday. Shrines are visited. Teachings are reviewed and reflected upon.
- 7-14 Pesach (Passover) -- **Judaism** -- Jewish 8 day pilgrimage festival celebrating the Exodus from slavery to freedom. Also known as Passover
- 7 Lazarus Saturday -- **Orthodox Christian** -- Celebration of the resurrection of Lazarus by Jesus, celebrated on the eve of Palm Sunday; revealing that Jesus in "the resurrection and life" of all mankind.
- 8 Easter -- **Christian** -- The most holy of Christian sacred days. The day commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ from his death by crucifixion. Observances include worship services beginning at sunrise, special music, feasting, and parades.
Palm Sunday – **Orthodox Christian**.
- 13 Holy Friday -- **Orthodox Christian**.
- 14 Baisakhi New Year – **Sikh** -- Hindu start of the New Years. Greetings that wish good life in coming days are exchanged. In Sikhi the day commemorates the founding of the Khalsa, a distinctive Sikh brotherhood.
- 15 Easter/Pascha -- **Orthodox Christian**.
- 19 Yom HaShoah -- **Judaism** -- Jewish Holocaust Day. The day has been established to remember the six million Jews killed by the Nazis in 1933-45. It is observed by many non-Jews as well.
- 21 First Day of Ridvan -- **Baha'i** -- Commemoration of the twelve day period in 1863 when Baha'u'llah declared that he was God's messenger for this age. Work is to be suspended on days 1, 9, and 12 of the festival.
- 23 St. George Day – **Christian** -- Remembrance of a person who, in the 4th century, was a martyr and became an ideal of martial valor and selflessness. Legend of killing a dragon is connected with this patron saint of England.
- 27 Yom Ha'Atzmaut -- **Judaism** -- Israel Independence Day. Israel celebrates 64 years of independence this year.
- 29 Ninth Day of Ridvan -- **Baha'I** -- Celebration of the arrival of Baha'u'llah at a sacred garden.
- 30 Saint James the Great Day -- **Orthodox Christian** -- Recognition of the martyrdom of the Apostle James the Great in 44 c.e
